Introduction

The Colne Valley Park covers more than 40 square miles and is the first real taste of countryside to the west of London. The Valley is a mosaic of farmland, woodland and water, with 200km of river and canal and over 70 lakes. It is also a living, working environment, providing employment and homes for many people, as well as being a haven for wildlife.



Protecting and enhancing the Colne Valley

The Colne Valley Park was established in 1965. The nature conservation value of the Colne Valley is one of its greatest assets. Many of its sites have been recognised for their wildlife or geological interest with designations such as National Nature Reserve (NNR) and Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI).

With each passing year, the Park has to fight harder than ever to preserve its precious and fragile landscape against a wave of threats. We take all professional routes to make a difference to stop these plans. If, however approval is given, we ensure the developers see the damage their proposals will cause and that they adapt their plans to reduce and compensate for the impact they have on the countryside.

The Landscape Partnership

The Colne Valley Park has joined wildlife organisations, local authorities and water companies to deliver a wide-ranging suite of projects which will enhance and protect the Park for the benefit of people and wildlife. This initiative is funded by Heritage Lottery and other funders.

Amongst other projects The Colne Valley Trail will get a facelift, the water voles on the River Colne will be given help to thrive, and conservation grazing will be introduced at three sites to help wild flowers and nature flourish. There will also be more opportunities to volunteer, such as by becoming one of our River Rangers.


Angling and Water Sports With 70 lakes and 200km of rivers there are plenty of venues for sailing, canoeing or angling.

Rickmansworth Lakes

Enjoy beautiful views as you walk the circular route around three attractive lakes. The lakes attract an astonishing number of waterbirds making this a birdwatchers paradise.

Grand Union Canal

Appreciate a gentler pace to life as you enjoy picturesque locks, historic canal side buildings and stunning views of the countryside. The tranquillity of the canal is a great way to experience the Colne Valley.

Slough Arm of the Grand Union Canal

A waterway bursting with history and wildlife, the sights and sounds make a visit well worthwhile. The eastern part of this canal is carried on an aqueduct which offers fantastic views from the towpath.

Arthur Jacob Nature Reserve and Poyle Poplars

The beautiful wetland reserve of Arthur Jacob offers four lagoons and an attractive riverside location. Poyle Poplars offers a peaceful shaded walk, a haven of tranquillity so close to Heathrow.

This popular park is set within 530 acres of attractive woodland, grassland and heathland with a centrepiece lake. Visitors can enjoy waterside and woodland walks, a children's woodland play area and a 'Go Ape' tree top trail.

A historic parkland of 130 acres where visitors can enjoy the ancient oak wood, fantastic views to Windsor Castle and the beautiful Edwardian Rhododendrons.

Bayhurst Wood Country Park

This beautiful ancient woodland is the ideal setting to view spring flowers or enjoy the wildlife of the streams & ponds. An ideal base from which to explore the local countryside.

11 Northmoor Hill Wood Nature Reserve

This small but varied woodland is full of wildlife and geological interest. Follow the "rock trail" to experience the interesting features of this site.

Frays Valley Nature Reserve 12

A series of large attractive lakes beside the Grand Union Canal. A wide, traffic-free path is ideal for cycling, riding and walking, many smaller paths providing secluded walks and a closeness to nature. The area also takes in the London Wildlife Trust's reserves of Frav's Meadow and Denham Lock Wood.

Denham Country Park

A scenic and relaxing location on the banks of the rivers Colne, Misbourne and Frays, the park is home to a mix of wildlife. Visitors may catch a glimpse of herons and kingfishers while in summer damselflies and dragonflies dart over the wet meadows.

Harmondsworth Moor Country Park

The open parkland contains a variety of habitats including meadows, rivers, lakes and ponds. Meandering paths take you through open countryside and new plantations.

An ideal spot for year-round enjoyment, the moor is an expanse of open countryside. Linked with the adjoining reservoirs of Staines and King George VI, it is internationally important for wintering wildfowl. The moor has been Common Land since 1065 when it was part of the medieval Manor of Staines.

Ankerwycke Estate

This is a secluded parkland lying on the banks of the River Thames and is the location of the signing of the Magna Carta in 1215. The area is rich with wildlife including kingfishers, owls and bats. See the old ruined priory and a 2,000 year old Yew tree.

Colne Valley Park Visitor Centre at Denham Country Park

Located at the heart of the Valley, the centre provides information about the whole of the Colne Valley Park. Set next to the beautiful River Misbourne, the centre is a great place to begin your walk, enjoy a picnic or go dipping for fish in the river. The facilities include a café, playground and is an ideal venue for parties, school visits and family outings.

Chiltern Open Air Museum

1. Heronsgate 2³/₄ miles

A peaceful country walk across farmland and through woods. **Start point:** Heronsgate Road, WD3 5BT

2. Old Shire Lane 6½ miles Follow ancient pathways to explore to the share of West have bluebell woods and the village of West have Start point: Car park at Maple Cross Recreated Ground off the A412 Denham Way, WD3 9SL

3. Horn Hill 3½ miles (short route 2¼) A delightful rural walk with views at every turn. Start point: Cheena Meadow car park, SL9 0EW

4. Chalfont Park 5 miles (short round for the second secon

5. Gerrards Cross 3³/₄ miles

Landscapes of ancient woodland and farmland with marvellous views from the sides of the Misbourne Valley. **Start point:** Gerrards Cross Station, SL9 8PP

6. Denham Woodlands 5¼ miles

A fantastic pocket of greenery, along a stream and through woodland. **Start point:** Northmoor Hill, UB9 5DF

7. Rickmansworth 1½ miles

Round lakes, over rivers, along the canal and beside a stream. **Start point:** Rickmansworth, WD3 1BB

8. Rickmansworth Lakes 3³/₄ miles

A peaceful walk around three lakes on what was once a busy gravel extraction site. **Start point:** Rickmansworth Aquadrome, WD3 1NB

9. Harefield and Batchworth Heights 5 miles

(short route 3½) Encompasses beautiful views and the best of the Colne Valley, passing Rickmansworth Lakes, the Grand Union Canal and surrounding farmland.

Start point: Rickmansworth Aquadrome, WD3 1NB

10. Mount Pleasant 3¼ (short route 2) miles

Enjoy a slower pace alongside the historic canal and the calm of lakes with thriving bird life. Fantastic views over the Colne Valley. **Start point:** Harefield Village Green, UB9 6BJ

11. South Harefield 3³/₄ miles (short route 2³/₄)

A walk along beautiful stretches of the Grand Union Canal and through farmland, with some of the best views anywhere in the Colne Valley. **Start point:** Canal Bridge at Moorhall Road, UB9 6PE

12. Grand Union Canal 4 miles

A peaceful stretch of the Grand Union Canal with views over magnificent lakes with thriving bird life. **Start point:** Colne Valley Park Visitor Centre, UB9 5PG

13. Denham 2½miles (short route 2¼)

Explore historic Denham village and the woodlands, waterways and meadows of Denham Country Park. **Start point:** Colne Valley Park Visitor Centre, UB9 5PG

14. Black Park 2¼ miles

Enjoy a varied patchwork of woodland, heathland and lakeside at Black Park. **Start point:** Black Park, SL3 6DT

15. Langley 4 miles (short route 2½)

Along the canal to quiet country lanes with views across ancient parkland to Langley Mansion.

Start point: Langley Railway Station, SL3 6DB

16. Iver 4½ miles (short route 3¼)

A lovely walk through countryside to the bank of the River Colne and the tow path of the Slough Arm of the Grand Union Canal. **Start point:** Iver High Street, SLO 9JZ

17. River Colne 4³/₄ miles A wonderful alternative route between Uxbridge and West Drayton. **Start point:** Little Britain, UB8 2JR

18. Harmondsworth Moor 21/4 miles

Through newly created parkland, with plentiful wildlife and views to Windsor Castle and London. **Start point:** Harmondsworth High Street, UB7 0AQ

19. Wraysbury 4½ miles

A varied and picturesque walk along the Colne Brook, River Thames, the magnificent Wraysbury Lakes, the National Trust Ankerwycke Estate and the village of Wraysbury. **Start point:** Wraysbury, TW19 5DB

20. Staines Moor 3½ miles (short route 2½)

A short walk with views of the Thames, historic Staines and Church Lammas Lakes. Start point: Lammas Park car park, TW18 4XZ

Colne Valley Park Visitor Centre

The Colne Valley Park Visitor Centre is at the heart of the Colne Valley Park. Open daily alongside the Groundwork Community Cafe, it has information about walks, activities, volunteering and places to visit in the Valley.
