Landscape Partnership Programme Highlights


Rivers

- Recruitment of 70 Volunteer River Rangers
- Angling and Nature
 Conservation Programme
 with Fisheries: first successful course run.
- Invasive species removal and education programme



Conservation

- Enhancing Colne Valley entry points (footpath improvements and information)
- Conservation grazing at three sites
- New sites given a facelift either for people (Swallow Street) or wildlife (Maple Lodge Marsh)



Engagement


- 78 events reaching diverse audiences.

Rivers Projects

Grants to local groups to install Kingfisher nest boxes at various sites.



Invasive species: Phase 1 of Floating Pennywort control programme completed. Including grants to local groups. We are now developing funding applications for the next few years

Denham Woodlands and other green spaces



We hold 99-year leases of ancient woodlands in Denham. Objectives of our management plan are:

- **Environment**: Maintain as mixed native species high forest. Improve woodland biodiversity.
- **Economic:** Take opportunities to generate income that can contribute towards costs of management
- **Social:** Maintain safe public access. Provide volunteering opportunities and engage people with woodland management.

The formation of the Regional Park in the mid-1960s was a far sighted step by the previous generation that seized the opportunity to restore derelict areas.

In the 21st century, the Colne Valley is subject to many huge development proposals. The CVRP is arguably the most threatened landscape of its kind in the country.

If this area is to host so many developments 'in the national interest', then local and national government must respond by creating conditions for a Regional Park that offers high quality green space for our capital city and beyond.

Published in 2019, this strategy is a **call to action**. It can be used by local authorities and others to coordinate planning and environmental mitigation.



The Strategy has already been used to inform the draft Spelthorne Local Plan. We hope other local authorities can follow that lead

Responding to development pressures

Written responses to development proposals and other consultations. Including:

- M25 West Motorway Service Area
- Maple Cross warehouses
- Lakeside Energy from Waste
- HS2 Schedule 17
- Lea Denham Crematorium
- Airspace 2050
- Heathrow Expansion


We have also engaged with the River Thames Scheme's emerging plans, making the case for mitigation sites. And we don't only write letters of objection – if a plan is positive and benefits the environment we will support it. For example we have written in support of docking points for a new Thames Ferry from Ankerwycke in the Colne Valley to Runnymede.

The Colne Valley Park is publicly and determinedly opposed to the HS2 project, which will have a direct, negative and permanent impact on a precious and already vulnerable landscape. In light of the government announcement to proceed with HS2, and the court decision on Heathrow expansion, we have updated our position statements:

With the help of our President and some local MPs, we have taken issues relating to HS2 and Heathrow expansion to the highest level e.g. a complaint about premature closure of Broadwater nature reserve that reached the Secretary of State. We have written to developers to express concern e.g seeking assurance that bird netting will not be used in the Colne Valley.




Coping with a pandemic

A big increase in Social media popularity







Core Funding

The financial position of the Colne Valley is far from secure:

- We are grateful for continuing help from local authorities, corporate supporters and our member organisations, especially to those who have increased their level of financial support recently.
- In these particularly tough times we all have to work harder to improve funding and extend what we can do as the threats increase.

Given threats posed by development, water shortages, pollution etc the Colne Valley is perhaps the most threatened landscape of its type in the country.

Project Fundraising

We work with our partners to apply for funding. Work in development includes:

- Mitigating the impact of motorways on connectivity for people and for wildlife.
- Improvement and protection of green spaces; landscape management, including ancient woodland.
- Landscape Partnership legacy. To ensure the good work of this three-year programme continues.

Development

Monitor and respond to planning applications and consultations to make the case for the local environment. In particular:

- South Bucks & Chiltern and Windsor & Maidenhead local plan examinations.
- Neighbourhood plans for Denham and Iver
- HS2 Schedule 17 applications including the restoration plans for the Chiltern tunnel and Colne Valley viaduct construction sites.
