



Is the Green Belt in the Colne Valley RP cared for?



The Local Authorities are not thinking about their positive role with the Green Belt and are allowing major development to proceed without the 'compensatory' improvements' (to environmental quality and accessibility of remaining Green Belt land) that should come with a Plan

The worst of all worlds

NPPF 142

".... Where it has been concluded that it is necessary to release Green Belt land for development (*in Plans*) They should also set out ways in which the impact of removing land from the Green Belt can be **offset through compensatory improvements to the environmental quality and accessibility of remaining Green Belt land**."

NPPF 145

Once Green Belts have been defined, Local Planning Authorities should plan positively to enhance their beneficial use, such as looking for opportunities to provide access; to provide opportunities for outdoor sport and recreation; to retain and enhance landscapes, visual amenity and biodiversity; or to improve damaged and derelict land.




The Colne Valley Regional Park and its Green Belt















What have we learnt?

- Gap in strategic, sub-regional and crossborder planning/ thinking
- 2. The 'Very Special Circumstances' clause in National Policy is being misused - we cannot rely on current Green Belt policy to deliver what's needed ichanges to the NPPF are needed to realise the potential
- 3. Green Belt policy ignores the CVRP's strategic importance for nature and public access we need to see a new form of landscape designation based on 'need' more than landscape beauty
- Government (national & local) must get it
 & lead







Recognise the **intrinsic value of countryside** to Green Belt policy

- Ensure that if major development is to happen, it is Plan Led, not via Very Special Circumstances (avoiding strategic mitigation & compensatory improvements)
- Introduce strategic planning at a landscape-scale, beyond Local Authority boundaries and 'red lines'
- Ensure that all change leads to better connectivity with generous green corridors for wildlife and people


